

*Contrastive Analysis on Recommendations for Tourists Visiting Culturally Diverse Metropoles: Brussels vs. Toronto*



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## Abstract

*It is rare that one would ever find themselves mentioning Toronto and Brussels in the same sentence other than perhaps when talking about one topic: demographic makeup. But when showcasing their home to the world, how do locals use multiculturalism (or not) to talk about or promote a cultural experience? To further investigate any potential latent differences and similarities, TripAdvisor forums pertaining to tourism in both Toronto and Brussels were analysed. The data retrieved throughout these forums served as the backbone for a survey to be administered to locals from each city. The instruments aimed to identify trends on whether locals from either city promote multicultural activities and food or rather perhaps elements of national culture. The study revealed that there were no overwhelming differences between the way locals from either Toronto or Brussels sell their city to tourists. Noteworthy was the discovery that Brussels locals who speak three or more languages responded with more positive attitudes towards encouraging locals to explore all neighborhoods of their city and to try ethnic food. Along those same lines, when asked about the types of cuisine a local would recommend, nearly all Toronto participants indicated that they would suggest that tourists eat ethnic food whereas almost all those from Brussels responded that they would recommend Belgian food.*

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## 1 Introduction

Cities go to extensive lengths in branding themselves but often use an outdated image, which may not be representative of their present-day demographic. Some cities seem to focus on identifying themselves with stereotypical products and services which used to be unique to their region. A tell-tale example of this is Brussels, where it is difficult to walk far out of its central square (*Grand Place*) without noticing the countless vendors of traditional Belgian items: fries, chocolate, waffles and caricatures of Tintin. Do these goods truly paint a picture of Brussels in 2020? According to a report published by France24 in 2019, Brussels is the second most cosmopolitan city in the world after Dubai (Dupont, 2019). Approximately 66% of its population was born abroad, and its culturally diverse residents from over 180 countries speak about 100 different languages (Dupont, 2019).

On the other hand, the tourism industry in cities like Toronto takes a different approach by seemingly refraining from promoting itself by using aspects of stereotypical Canadian culture. Instead, Toronto's official tourism videos and the photos displayed throughout its international airport show culturally diverse groups of people practicing different traditions and eating a variety of meals. It seems as though the tourism department is trying to promote a narrative that when visiting Toronto, one must take advantage of all the international food and entertainment which are indicative of the current demographic make-up of the city. In a piece published by the BBC in 2017, Toronto is said to welcome over 100,000 new residents each year (Galloway, 2017). Data also indicates that its residents speak over 140 languages (Galloway, 2017).

These statistics show that Brussels and Toronto are two of the most multicultural cities on the planet. The difference, however, is that one seems to promote its multicultural image while the other seems to hide it. To analyze the accuracy of this observation, it will be important to gain insight perceptions from locals on both sides. In this dissertation, data has been obtained from participants who live in Brussels and Toronto in order to learn about the type of image they would like to promote about their own city. Should these cities include more elements of multiculturality or national culture? Or perhaps a mix of both?

### Research Question

*How is Toronto's and Brussel's multiculturalism reflected in their tourism campaigns?*

### Sub-Research Questions

- *What type of cultural recommendations do Torontonians and Bruxellois(e), Brusselaar/Brusselse offer to the tourists visiting their respective cities?*
- *Do the residents of Toronto and Brussels recommend touristic activities which reflect multicultural make-up of their cities?*

## 2 Theoretical Framework

As a starting point for analysing how city dwellers make sense of the diversity within their cities, it is critical to look at the underpinnings of the ways in which academia defines multiculturalism in Canada. The Canadian idea of multiculturalism serves as a unique example of what a diverse demographic can resemble as collective living together in society. As Winter (2007) explains, multiculturalism often takes as a transformation of the national imagery in pluralist terms. A place can truly be considered multicultural when a majority within it becomes aware of its particularity as group which shares its society with others all the while not having a desire or power to impose a certain identity on those that belong to different groups (Winter, 2007).

Thus, Winter presents the idea that multiculturalism usually includes the following two distinct features:

1. Demographic – A state's plural composition of a population
2. Policy - Defined in terms of goals such as stimulating the participation of immigrants within the stream of society through the maintenance and active support of cultural minorities, refining the socioeconomic position while also including support of cultural minorities and finally improving psychological aspects such as support and acceptance of plural composition and diversity by all groups.

In Canada, the dominant discourse of multiculturalism today represents powerful social imagery (Winter, 2007). Shortly after adoption and acceptance by the population, Winter (2007) explains that social imagery turns into national imaginary (Winter, 2007). That being said, academic commentators in Canada have criticized their government for pinning multiculturalism too tightly to socioeconomics (Winter, 2007). Winter (2007) explains that Canadian officials too often focus on the economic concerns of individuals from different cultures which leads them to rarely address people's grassroots concerns pertaining to quality of life (Winter, 2007). The Canadian government's fixation on striving for a multicultural

dream state has been cited as one of the reasons for Québec's periodic desire for independence (Winter, 2007). This concept of harmonious multiculturalism only being an ideal pushed forward by the government is noteworthy as it could be pertinent to uncover whether or not the population buys into the message.

Going off of the definition of Canadian multiculturalism, Toronto, the country's largest city, receives millions of tourists each year. A 1998 survey by Joppe, Martin and Waalen (2001) on the image tourists had of their visit to Toronto revealed that although most tourists reported being satisfied with the city, results varied depending on the tourists' country of origin. Participants were categorized by whether they originated from Canada, the United States or a country overseas (Joppe et al., 2001). The study recorded levels of satisfaction on factors such as transportation, accommodation, cleanliness, safety and so on (Joppe et al., 2001). Out the sample of 359 tourists, Americans rated the highest level of satisfaction, followed by tourists from overseas, with Canadians from other parts of Canada rating the lowest (Joppe et al., 2001). The results of these established expectations have led to a high rate in return visits to Toronto (Joppe et al., 2001). Demographic change, a greater demand for productivity from service providers, enhanced technological sophistication, a greater demand for tourism-related services were all seen have an impact on the perception, management, and significance of service quality in tourism (Joppe et al., 2001). So, it could be interesting to see if tourist recommendations are curated depending on if the local who gives the suggestion knows the origin of the incoming tourist.

Belgium, on the other hand, is considered an immigrant-receiving society even though there is no proactive federal immigration policy (Martiniello, 2013). Most migrants come from within the European Union (Martiniello, 2013). France and The Netherlands were, in 2007, the top source countries in general (Martiniello, 2013). That being said, Morocco and Turkey were the most important countries of origin for new migrants to Belgium by means of family reunification (Martiniello, 2013). Most immigrants settle in Flanders, followed by Brussels and then Wallonia. The reason for this can be linked to Flanders' stronger economic position in Europe (Martiniello, 2013). Labour migration, freedom of circulation of European citizens, asylum seekers, family reunification, foreign students all consist of common reasons why newcomers settle in Belgium (Martiniello, 2013).

In Brussels specifically, most immigrants come from either Poland or Romania. 28% of the Brussels population is foreign, considerably more than Wallonia or Flanders (Martiniello, 2013). This figure does not account for migrants who eventually received citizenship. If it did, that number would increase by approximately 12%. As Martiniello

(2013) explains, this statistic represents an indicator as to how and why diversity, was regarded as a structural component of the region; few defend a vision of a monocultural capital region. It is increasingly difficult to identify a majority to which newcomers should conform (Martiniello, 2013). The urban region has become a multicultural, multi-ethnic, multiracial and multifaith society in a more intense way than the other regions of the country (Martiniello, 2013). How to combine this structural diversity with enough unity is the central element at the core of debates in Brussels. In other words, the challenge is not to plan effective assimilation while allowing for superficial diversity as in the other regions (Martiniello, 2013). Instead, it is more about building a new multicultural Brussels citizenship based on a shared local identification (Martiniello, 2013).

Today, cultural tourism research has just started to pique the curiosity of researchers, especially in cities which have experienced considerable change in recent years. Two such places are Berlin, and the neighborhood of Harlem in New York City. Though only one article of this type of research has been conducted on Toronto and none known for Brussels, it could be relevant for analytical purposes to compare and contrast the findings from the studies on Berlin (Schmiz, 2017) and Harlem (Hoffman, 2003).

Berlin's propulsion back onto the world stage in the aftermath of the Second World War has served as an interesting case study in tourism research. Its multicultural identity developed rather organically as countless tourists each year feel a pull towards its "poor but sexy" character (Schmiz, 2017). As the city's demographic started to diversify after the war, multiculturalism and tolerance served as Berlin's unique selling points (Schmiz, 2017). Initiatives such as the Carnival of Cultures became a significant bottom-up lead event although it faced resistance from political parties that wanted Berlin to be marketed differently (Schmiz, 2017). True direction and ownership of its multicultural label kicked off in 2002 with a new social democratic political rule (Schmiz, 2017). This change was reflected in the 'be Berlin' campaign with the slogan 'the place to be', which declared Berlin a diverse, colorful and city (Schmiz, 2017, p. 293).

Another example similar to this is Harlem, a neighborhood in New York City where multiculturalism and diversity have recently been a positive characteristic for tourism (Hoffman, 2003). When mobility was not as easy as it is today, being a tourist was reserved for those of a higher class. This reality simplified the tourism industry's task of figuring how to cater to which types of people (Hoffman, 2003). Nowadays, however, public and private tourism entities alike must adapt and learn how to cater to a wide array of people as opposed to niche segment of the population (Hoffman, 2003). In accordance to this, the activities in

which tourists partake have also expanded in the last few decades (Hoffman, 2003). As Hoffman states: “In a relatively short time, the concept of cultural tourism has broadened beyond the focus on museums and theaters to include an anthropological concern with people and place” (p. 291). In the wake of internationalization, Harlem is also becoming a place where ethnicity and diversity are unique selling points for tourists (Hoffman, 2003).

All in all, the important question remains whether multiculturalism was a major determinant in the kinds of activities tourists would partake in when they visited these cities. In the case of Berlin, the Carnival of Cultures was shown to draw outsiders to the city. Whereas in the case of Harlem, it is demonstrated that its multiple multicultural attractions are one reason that hundreds of thousands visit New York City each year.

One of the major reasons as to why cities decide to invest in tourism is its economic and societal benefits (Uysal, 2013). Ways in which to boost tourism consist of improving safety, cleanliness, quality of services, culinary scenes and city symbols (Uysal, 2013). Furthermore, in her book, *Tourism Marketing for Cities and Towns*, Kolb (2011) states that tourism marketing must always focus on one segment of the population. Though it may seem attractive for time and money purposes to cater to the masses, the concern is that the message delivered by a tourism campaign may not appeal to everyone since everyone's needs and interests are different (Kolb, 2011). For this reason, it is always important for a tourism organization to always start any project by identifying which segment of the population is the target audience (Kolb, 2011).

This last approach has been utilized increasingly in the last few decades. This kind of branding involves promoting the unique benefits that the tourist will experience while visiting the city rather than the city itself (Kolb, 2011). With this in mind, logic would suggest that a combination of both national culture and multicultural activities could be beneficial to promote by official tourism entities.

Cities and countries being multicultural can represent opportunities for governments, but how people feel about it at a grassroots level is a different question. Built on a foundation of recent research advancements in the field, the Multicultural Personality Questionnaire was designed to multidimensionally measure multicultural effectiveness (Law, 2008). Specifically, the questionnaire sought out to measure how much successful operating within a new cultural environment is linked to psychological well-being (Law, 2008). Other themes the questionnaire assesses include professional effectiveness, personal adjustment, and intercultural interaction, which can be considered as interest in and ability to deal with

individuals from a different cultural background (Law, 2008). Questionnaires are commonly used as a reliable tool to test how a population receives the concept of multiculturality.

Similarly, the field of intercultural communication (ICC) can be interesting to look at in terms of learning about how individuals “do” culture. Indeed, Kramsch and Hua (2016) elaborate on the theories of how this relatively new field has evolved considerably of the last few decades. Most notably, in its way of seeing culture as not being given, static or something you belong to or live with, but rather something one does, or, as a verb for meaning making (Kramsch & Hua, 2016). Therefore, culture should not be considered something that people are prescribed (Kramsch & Hua, 2016).

Kramsch and Hua (2016) also go on to explain that seeing “ICC as a social (inter)action means that we can no longer assume that the problems experienced in ICC are cultural misunderstandings which can be made good or pre-empted if people can somehow see ‘good intentions’ in each other’s actions or have sufficient cultural information or skills” (p. 5). The way these problems can be solved is through honing one’s intercultural competence, hence learning about various cultures and languages on a general level.

An underlying element behind the broader concept of diversity and culture is the interplay of ingroup and outgroup dynamics. Studies have shown that when individuals are asked to describe themselves, they often do so on a basis of nationality, race and occupation (Noel, Bascombe & Wann, 1995). This self-categorizing process is also often important for determining the nature of the group one will associate with (Noel et al., 1995). Although ingroup-outgroup research has varied on several fronts throughout the realm of academia, it is generally agreed upon that group membership is important for self-esteem and to have a clear definition of one’s self (Noel et al., 1995). It is also plausible that some feel a stronger association to a group than others. As Noel, Bascombe and Wann (1995) put it, it usually depends on how close the group member incorporates the group onto his self-concept (p.128).

As previously mentioned, one way to obtain data in order to answer the research question herein is by surveying comments posted in TripAdvisor’s Travel Board forum. To say that TripAdvisor has revolutionized the tourism industry over the past decade would be an understatement. As explained by Traiger (2008), TripAdvisor as focal firm in the ecosystem depends on the willingness of consumers to provide content and use the platform for trip planning. Innovations in technology are key drivers for structural changes in the tourism industry (Traiger, 2008). Furthermore, understanding the various ways in which open

innovation can be structured is of utmost importance for tourism industry players in order to identify innovation opportunities (Traiger, 2008).

In summary, TripAdvisor's business plan rests on customer-driven value creation. It is the value proposition of the firm in terms of how it helps the customer to co-create value. It facilitates and gives recognition for the generation of content by travellers and increases the value of this content by linking it to information and services provided by businesses/destinations (Traiger, 2008). TripAdvisor's ecosystem reflects the networked nature of tourism and consequently provides significant insights for the tourism industry in terms of how build on service provision which can be structured to serve both customer and business partner needs (Traiger, 2008).

Certain key features of TripAdvisor include the following:

1. Profile Customisation: subscribers can edit their profiles in order to search and view travel suggestions and reviews according to their travel preferences and profile.
2. Status: Users can display their know-how and obtain recognition for their help.
3. Metasearch Decision support: Prices for different booking platforms/airlines are displayed simultaneously to allow for price comparisons
4. Information filtering: Travellers can view recommendations backed by Facebook friends, who they know and trust more than strangers.
5. Interaction and networking: Tourists can find and interact with people they know (friends) and strangers (e.g. users wishing to visit Shanghai can find people who have previously visited the city).
6. Crowd sourcing>Status: Users promote their profiles within their Facebook network to build social status. This creates incentives to add more content for the benefit of others: 35 % of new reviews are from Facebook-connected users (TripAdvisor.com, 2013b). Apps Location-based/offline services: Apps provide travellers with location-specific content when on the go and with offline city guides.
7. Forums Social interaction/Collaboration: Members can ask for advice and share their opinions.

The choice for administering surveys in the tourism industry can be considered a risky one for validity reasons. The format of a survey has an impact on the types of answers it obtains. According to Dolnicar, Laesser and Matus, (2008) one such reason is that even

today, deciding on whether or not to use a paper or electronic method can pose a serious problem. It can hide an unintentional bias against those who do not have access to an electronic device. Using an electronic only survey has been shown to exclude persons on one end of the sociodemographic spectrum. Additionally, research indicated that paper surveys lead to lower dropout rates and less incomplete data. To make up for this pitfall and increase the validity of the tool, it is crucial for the tourism survey to include various methods within the questionnaire itself. In other words, a combination of open-ended questions and Likert scale items increases the validity of survey significantly. To eliminate the possibility of creating a bias, a multimethod tactic consisting of using different approaches within an approach should be implemented. One reason for this is that if a Cronbach's Alpha test reveals discrepancies between groups of Likert Scale items, a researcher has the possibility of relying on qualitative answers within the survey, hence the open-ended questions.

### 3 Methodology

As per mentioned earlier, the methodological approach implemented for the purposes of this research consisted of two parts. The first being the searching of TripAdvisor forums in order to identify commonalities within the questions and responses that prospective tourists and locals have on their cities. The second part consisted of questioning locals about how they go about considering suggestions and recommendations for what to see, do and eat in Toronto and Brussels.

#### *1. TripAdvisor - Discourse Analysis*

As previously mentioned, one way to obtain data to answer the research question herein is by surveying comments posted in TripAdvisor's Travel Board forum. Past research has laid a solid foundation for how this platform can be used for similar types of studies (Traiger, 2008, Law, 2006). The way in which I plan to use it is by making use of its search engine capability, which returns a list of postings that match selected criteria (Traiger, 2008). Specifically, my plan is to focus on extracting information relevant to the research question from TripAdvisor's forums. As Traiger (2008) explains "Forums are discussion boards in which travelers can ask (and answer) questions, share their personal travel experiences, and get advice." (p. 15).

Upon analyzing first scan of the forums of questions, answers, and the occasional testimonial posted by future tourists and locals of the two cities, it was clear that a specific tertium comparationis needed to be implemented (ten Thije, 2020). In other words, there needed to be an adequate and reliable point of reference (ten Thije, 2020). Such reference is necessary for contrastive studies like the one at hand (ten Thije, 2020). The time span was the six months between August 20<sup>th</sup>, 2019 and February 20<sup>th</sup>, 2020, hence the tertium comparationis, allocated for the retrieval of the TripAdvisor posts for Brussels and Toronto.

The motive behind narrowing the corpus down to a six-month period is that any less of a time frame would not have yielded the opportunity to find enough relevant data. In other words, a shorter time frame would not have allowed to find sufficient posts that would fall into the research realm of multiculturality-related efforts in tourism. In order to make the study as relevant as possible, the obvious choice was to decide on a more recent time frame. On the other hand, analyzing TripAdvisor forums of greater than six months of posts would not only have been excessive and infinitely complicated to code, the risk of having an even larger divergence between the percentage of Toronto posts and Brussels posts would have been magnified.

It is also important to state that there were twice as many postings for Toronto than there were for Brussels. For example, 128 excerpts appeared throughout the selection of posts I chose for Toronto compared to 64 for Brussels.

The research was done using a corpus-based approach. Implementing a corpus-based methodology involves a deductive approach in which the corpus at hand acts as a catalyst aiding to confirm or reject a pre-existing theoretical construct. Also, it tends to test the validity of a given hypothesis against a carefully selected corpus data set. This is in direct contrast to the corpus-driven approach which is inductive in that it decides upon a targeted corpus and through interpretation cyclical analysis of a corpus data. It tends to generalize some kind of theory or a rule. As Tognini-Bonelli (2001) explains “Corpus-based studies typically use corpus data in order to explore a theory or hypothesis, aiming to validate it, refute it or refine it”. Finally, when the research circumstances allow for both corpus-based and corpus-driven analyses, the researcher may hybridize both approaches combining the merits of deduction and induction at the same time.

Due to the high number of posts, the objective was to focus on what kind of information could be found in more general posts pertaining to expectations or impressions, such as what to do for a short stay in either Toronto or Brussels. Below are examples of selected posts for each city.

Toronto

*“Just had lunch with coworkers who both lived in Toronto. They started getting nostalgic about Toronto. What I love about it is the distinct neighbourhoods. The city is just so RICH with culture!”*

*“One place I always like to recommend because it is "very Toronto" is Banh Mi Boys. There are several locations. It is a place that serves Vietnamese inspired sub sandwiches and Korean inspired filled/steamed buns. Toronto could very well be the most culturally diverse city in the world (more than half of us born elsewhere) and this is a great example of us 2nd generation Canadians fusing our ancestral cultures with the modern one. Plus, the sandwiches are cheap and delicious! My favourites are the 5-spice pork belly banh mi and the fried chicken bao.”*

*“Hi. Considering visiting the last week of June. Is 7 days too long? Wondering if I can fill my time. I'm originally from NYC, so like large cities. I'm considering staying near the Entertainment district. BTW, I stayed 7 nights in Quebec City, and I loved it. However it was a unique experience with European charm. I'm afraid Toronto may be too much like NYC...but without the culture. Thank you”*

Brussels

*“Hello, I will be traveling from London to Brussels in early December for about 5 days (from America). I would like to visit Brussels, Ghent, Bruges, and Antwerp. I was wondering if I should just stay in Brussels the whole time and then just take the train to each of these cities (one city a day). Or stay in Brussels the first two days and then stay one night in each of these cities. Which of these cities should I allocate the most time to? I'm 26 years old and am mostly interested in the beer, food, and architecture of Belgium”*

*“For multicultural reason the name Christmas market is not often used anymore. Information will be published here <https://www.plaisirsdhiver.be/en/>. You will notice there are no details yet, but you can use last year program as a reference here <https://www.brussels.be/winter-wonders>”*

Threads that consisted a local expert referring the soon-to-be tourist to website links were usually discarded. Similarly, posts that included comments which were replaced by an automated messaging indicating that the original message was vulgar/inappropriate were also discarded. The following is an example message of a post that was flagged and subsequently removed:

*“-:- Message from Tripadvisor staff -:-*

*This post has been removed at the author's request. The author may repost if desired.*

*Posts on the Tripadvisor forums may be edited for a short period of time. Once the edit period has expired, authors may update their posts by removing and reposting them.*

### 3.1 Coding Procedure

Upon having finalized the process of selecting the TripAdvisor interactions for each city, the posts were exported into a Microsoft Word document. From there, they were subsequently transferred into Nvivo in order to start analysing the discourse. After having scanned the posts once more, themes relating to the researched question were identified.

Those themes - labelled as Nodes in Nvivo - were the following:

<b>Recommending</b>
<b>Multiculturality– General</b>
Providing a suggestion pertaining to where the subject can partake in cultural-related activities. Usually in form of a specific recommendation
<b>Multiculturality – Food</b>

<p>Providing a suggestion pertaining to where the subject can find ethnic food.</p> <p>Usually in form of a recommendation</p>
<p><b>National Culture - General</b></p> <p>Providing a suggestion pertaining to where the subject can partake in local/national related activities. Usually in form of a recommendation</p>
<p><b>National Culture – Food</b></p> <p>Providing a suggestion pertaining to where the subject can find local/national food. Usually in form of a recommendation</p>
<p><b>National Culture – Day Trips</b></p> <p>Providing a suggestion pertaining to where the subject can go on a day trip.</p> <p>Usually in form of a recommendation</p>
<p><b>Cultural Inquiry – Clarification</b></p> <p>When a local responded to a question by asking the future tourist to clarify what they are seeking for, whether it be museums, ethnic food, art festivals, etc</p>
<p><b><u>Commenting</u></b></p> <p>A general comment about the demographic makeup of the city, sometimes compared to other cities. For example, comparing Toronto's cultural diversity to that of New York's</p>

The bulk of this process consisted of identifying, selecting and then transferring the excerpts into their respective code categories. Some of the information retrieved were assessed to belong to two or more categories.

### 3.2 Survey Design

#### 3.2.1 Sections

Based on the findings retrieved from the TripAdvisor comments, a 21-item survey was designed to inquire how locals promote their respective cities to tourists. The opening page of the questionnaire lays out information pertaining to the purpose for collecting the survey data. The page also informs the participants that their responses will be anonymized. Once the prospective respondent has read all the terms, a check box at the bottom of the page has to be ticked in order for the respondent to proceed with the survey. The check box serves as a clear and explicit representation of consent.

Subsequently, the questionnaire delves into demographic-related questions. Similar to the forced response from the previous page, the one obligatory question consists of inquiring whether the respondent comes from either Toronto, Brussels or “Other”. In order for the survey to be eligible to be counted in the study, the prospective respondent must reside in one of the two aforementioned cities. All surveys received from respondents who did not at the time live in one of the two cities were discarded. In addition to knowing their place of residence, the survey also asked respondents which gender they identify to, their age, how long they have lived in their respective cities, how many languages they speak at a moderate level and what their ideal vacation would consist of. The objective behind having these kinds of questions was to better compartmentalize the data based on the results of the research question-related items.

In regard to the principal survey questions, the items were separated into two parts. The first consisting of open questions and the second being 7-point Likert scale items (see survey in Appendix section). Dörnyei explains the advantages of using qualitative and quantitative data by explaining that it allows the researcher to obtain a fuller understanding of a phenomenon as well as to verify one set of findings against each other (2007). Specifically, the goal of a mixed methods approach is to understand a complex matter by looking at it from multiple angles (Dörnyei, 2007). Along the same lines, triangulation is desired to validate conclusions by converging results obtained using different methods (Dörnyei, 2007).

Only one version of the survey was designed for both the participants of Brussels and of Toronto. Upon the initial completion of the survey questionnaire in English, it was then translated into French and even in Dutch thanks to efforts from generous assistant researchers. The assistant researchers whose names are mentioned in the Acknowledgment section of this report also helped in translating the responses of the Dutch-filled surveys.

The purpose of diversifying the types of questions stems from the need to produce a varied data set. To keep the open questions as concise as possible, the survey requests that the respondent provide three ideas to questions such as what are the three first things that come to their mind when you think of their city. This question was posed to each participant group about their own city as well about the other city. In other words, the two groups had to share three words on the first words that come to mind when thinking of both Toronto and Brussels. Additionally, the structure of other questions which, for example, ask the respondent what types of activities and foods they would recommend a tourist, serves to provide flexibility in allowing the participant the option to either write substantial amount of just a few words.

As for the Likert scale questions, a similar method to the open questions was applied by converting questions into an attitudinal format. Once again possible scenarios and outcomes are given here for the respondent to determine whether or not they could see a situation play out that way. For example, would they only provide ethnic food restaurant-recommendations if a tourist specifically asked for it. The important component to be considered here was to formulate half of the questions in a positively worded manner and the others in a negative stance. In other words, items were designed using a variety of formulations relating to the same perception. By doing so, the researcher could possibly determine if respondents are clearly reading each question or if they simply gloss over them and select the same answer for all.

Though participants did not explicitly have access to leave comments upon completing the survey, they could and often did manage to send a direct message to the researcher who was posting the survey on Facebook, Reddit and TripAdvisor from his personal account.


### 3.2.2 Distribution

The Facebook groups used were the following: Brussels Interns, Events in Brussels, I LOVE BRUSSELS, Expats in Brussels, and Indians in Brussels. The Reddit pages were r/belgium, r/brussels, r/BruxellesMaBelle, and r/Wallonia. The survey was also posted on both the Toronto and Brussels TripAdvisor forums. In addition, the researcher also sent the survey to a few friends, family and acquaintances living in the two cities. Since the researcher experienced slightly more difficulty finding participants who lived in the Brussels area, he asked individuals who know people in the area to pass it on to their personal network.

### 3.2.3 Demographics


A total of 79 respondents replied to the survey, of which seven were ineligible due to incomplete surveys, being under 18-years-old or where they came from. If they did not currently live the Brussels or Toronto area, their responses were discarded. The remaining 72 participants (32 female, 40 male; mean age = 32,17) (graphic 1) were split into two groups based on the city they inhabited: 39 were classified as being Brussels locals and 33 were classified as Toronto locals (graphic 1).

Graphic 1: Gender




Approximately half of the Brussels locals were relatively new to the city whereas most of the Toronto respondents had lived in the city for over five years (Brussels; under five years = 55.54%, Toronto; over five years = 77.78% (graphic 2).

Graphic 2: Length of time in city




An overwhelming majority of Brussels participants spoke three or more languages whereas most of the Toronto cohort spoke under three languages (Brussels; three or more languages = 79.45%, Toronto; three or more languages = 18.19%) (graphic 3).

Graphic 3: Number of Languages Spoken at a Moderate Level




Regarding the age of the respondents, the participants from Brussels ( $M = 31.24$ ,  $SD = 12$ ) were on average slightly younger than the Toronto respondents ( $M = 33.28$ ,  $SD = 13.54$ ) (graphic 4).

When it came to the types of preferred vacations that the participants would prefer to go on, for both cities the most common answer proved to be “Cultural (different region of the world)” and least was “Staying at home”, Brussels = 66.66%, Toronto = 63.88% and Brussels = 0%, Toronto = 2.78%, respectively (graphic 5).

The most used language to fill in the survey was English, followed by French and then Dutch: English = 81.94%, French = 12.50%, Dutch = 5.56%, respectively

## 4Results & Analysis

### TripAdvisor - Forum Scan

This subsection looks at the percentage of Brussels and Toronto TripAdvisor recommendations (see Appendix) that fell into each of the categories defined, retrieved in the previous section. Based off of what most locals seem to focus on in terms of what they view their city, a survey was subsequently designs with an emphasis on the themes that were most commonly represented. The percentages can be found below (table 1)

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In chronological order and as demonstrated in the table above, the three most common talking points for the locals from Brussels in the TripAdvisor forums were the following:

1. National Culture – General
2. National Culture – Day Trips
3. Multiculturality – General

In order, the three least mentioned talking points for the locals from Brussels in the TripAdvisor forums were the following:

1. General Commenting
2. Multiculturality – Food
3. Cultural Inquiry – Clarification

In order, the three most talked about topics from the Toronto locals in the TripAdvisor forums were the following:

1. Multiculturality – General
2. Multiculturality – Food
3. National Culture – General

In chronological order, the three least brought up points for the locals by Toronto locals in the TripAdvisor forums were the following:

1. National Culture – Day Trips
2. Cultural Inquiry – Clarification
3. General Commenting

Upon observing the commonalities and differences between the percentage a survey was designed with emphasis on the common themes represented throughout the TripAdvisor forums.

## **Survey**

This section will present the results of statistical tests performed on the selected data. The initial step consisted of verifying the reliability of the survey test instrument. Second, an

independent T-Test was performed to test the main research questions, whether multiculturalism had an impact on the type of recommendations that the locals from each city gave to tourists Subsequently, Pearson Correlation Coefficient tests were conducted within the data set of the individual cities and within the two categories, namely the items pertaining to national culture and those pertaining to multiculturality. Next, a One-Way ANOVA test was conducted to test if there is a relationship between a factor variable from the demographic section with one of the Likert scale items.

### *Cronbach's Alpha*

In order to test the validity of the item constructs, Cronbach's Reliability tests were conducted. Cronbach's Alpha consists of a measure for verifying the reliability and consistency of the sampling instrument and examines whether all the data were measured the same underlying construct. If the Alpha results is 0.5, it is acceptable but quantitatively weak. Dörnyei expands on this point by explaining that it is possible that the inconsistency in scores could be due a respondent answering a survey in a language different from their mother tongue scores that do not reach “:0.60 on the Cronbach's Alpha scale should sound warning bells” (Dörnyei, 2007, p. 206). Hence the qualitative focus, consisting of the sets of words and quotes, became especially important. For the Brussels survey, the National Culture and Multiculturality related items produced unacceptable scores. For the Toronto survey, the National Culture items and all items together produced unacceptable scores. For all respondents combined together, the overall set of comparing the overall items to one another produced an unacceptable score (table 2). With these scores in mind, it was often the case that the Alpha was slightly higher when the item on discouraging visits to ethnic neighborhoods and about their city having more to offer compared to less multicultural cities had been deleted. That being said, these scores would still not have surpassed the 0.60 threshold.

### **Toronto**

The city where the participants reside and their attitude towards multiculturalism positively influencing the diversity of restaurants to choose from were compared. On average Toronto locals ( $M = 6.67$ ,  $SD = 0.65$ ) reported more positive attitudes

towards the diversity of restaurant of which to choose from than Brussels locals ( $M = 6.26$ ,  $SD = 0.94$ ). The results of an Independent Samples T-Test showed that this difference was statistically significant,  $t(67.38)=-2.19, p<0.05$ .

The city where the participants reside and their attitude towards their multicultural city having more to offer compared to more diverse cities. On average Toronto locals ( $M = 5.97$ ,  $SD = 1.21$ ) reported more negative attitudes than Brussels locals ( $M = 4.21$ ,  $SD = 1.67$ ) regarding the belief that their metropolis has more to offer compared to more monocultural cities. The results of an Independent Samples T-Test showed that this difference was statistically significant,  $t(68.47)=-5.18, p<0.01$ . In this case – since  $p < .01$  there is even less of a probability that these results were due to chance.

The results of the Pearson Correlation Coefficient test show there is a weak positive linear relationship between Toronto locals' attitudes towards the notion that they tend more to promote national culture to tourists and their belief that they only recommend ethnic food if a tourist specifically asked for it: ( $r(31)=.39, p<0.05$ ) (table 3).

The results of the Pearson Correlation Coefficient test show there is a moderate positive linear relationship between Toronto locals' attitudes towards discouraging tourists

from going to ethnic neighbourhoods and asking tourists what type of cultural experience they would be interested when visiting the local's city: ( $r(31)=.47$ ,  $p<0.01$ ) (table 4).

The results of the Pearson Correlation Coefficient test show there is no relationship between Toronto locals' attitudes towards the notion that they would only recommend ethnic food if a tourist specifically asked for it and their belief that ethnic restaurants are replacing local food joints. ( $r(31)=-.04$ ,  $p>0.05$ ) (table 5).

The results of the Pearson Correlation Coefficient test show there is a weak positive linear relationship between Toronto locals' attitudes towards their belief that their multicultural city had more to offer compared to less diverse cities and the idea that

multiculturalism positively influences the diversity of restaurants of which to choose from: ( $r(31)=.35$ ,  $p<0.05$ ) (table 6).

The results of the Pearson Correlation Coefficient test show there is no relationship between Toronto locals' attitudes towards the idea that becoming more politically correct is good and the notion that their multicultural city has more to offer compared to less diverse cities: ( $r(31)=.03$ ,  $p>0.05$ ) (table 6).

The results of the Pearson Correlation Coefficient test show there is a moderate positive linear relationship between Toronto locals' attitudes towards the notion that their multicultural city has more to offer compared to less diverse cities and their belief that they would include the word "multicultural" when describing their city to a tourist: ( $r(31)=.43$ ,  $p<0.05$ ) (table 6).

### Open-Ended Questions

When analysing the survey item which required Toronto respondents to write three words that come to mind when thinking about Brussels, the simplest solution was to categorise the words into three groups. The largest category consisted of all that was food related. Overwhelmingly, the Toronto locals jotted down words such as *Beer, fries* and *sprouts*. The second most common category were words that pertained to the city's

geography and institutional role. Nearly one in five Toronto locals mentioned that Brussels was the capital of the European union or mentioned *Belgium, metropolis*, and so on. The third most common category were those who acknowledged that they knew nothing about the city. One such respondent was rather upfront about their lack of knowledge on Brussels and admitted *Don't know Brussels at all, nothing comes to mind*. One other respondent was also just as forward by writing *Clueless - empty, Never been*. Respondents that were too ambiguous to decipher such as *Unknown, interesting, adventure* were placed into this category. This particular answer, however, most likely speaks to the negativity of emptiness but also the positivity of the unknown and adventure. The fourth and final category was the culture category. Though none of the Toronto respondents had words pertaining to multiculturalism, one had words which could be loosely attributed to Culture. Interestingly, the participant wrote these four words *Belgian, French flemish, culture*. All answers from the Toronto respondents were categorized as being neutral. No biases were identified.

The Toronto locals' words about their city, on the other hand, did reveal several positive attitudes. Commonly respondents used words such as *exciting, safe, clean, progress, fun, great time, happy, world class* and *party*. Approximately just as much as the positive attitudinal responses were the neutral words or those that could not be placed in either the positive or the negative category. Indeed, words such as *home, busy, big* were both used extremely commonly and fell in between both what could be categorized as good or bad. Finally, there were a few responses that could clearly be attributed to having a somewhat negative attitude. These responses included words like *expensive, gray* and *traffic*. Only two participants had these kinds of responses.

As shown above, the Toronto locals often reverted to using adjectives for talking about their city. This and other rather obscure words such as *6ix, Foodies* and *Patio* made categorizing the responses extremely difficult. For example, although it cannot be confirmed, it is believed that *6ix* refers to Toronto's nickname popularised by local rapper Drake. That being said, the most 76% of words were the following *multicultural, city, big* and *diverse*. As for the nature of the types of activities that the Toronto locals would recommend when visiting their city, 64% of participants offered suggestions which only pertained to National Culture like *the CN Tower, Sports games, craft brewery tour* whereas the remaining 36% recommended a mix of some multicultural activities like *eat in Little Italy, Chinatown* and *Aga Khan Museum* and Canadian ones as well.

For the food recommendations, however, the participants tended to offer much more multicultural (27) suggestions which often included the likes of *Indian, Asian fusion, Italian*

and *African*. In this section, the passion of the participants is quite clear through responses such as *Any type they wish, we have them all*", *whatever they haven't tried before/enjoy!*, *Any which they cannot find in their hometown*, *Ethnic - all kinds* and *oh gosh, Thai, Indian, Korean*. Only one respondent answered, *Local burger joint*.

### **Brussels**

Perhaps most interestingly, the results of the One-Way ANOVA test show that the number of languages that a Brussels local speaks has a significant impact on whether or not they recommend ethnic food restaurant options to tourists  $F(4, 34) = 3.98$ ,  $p = 009. 13$  respondents (4 to 5 language range) somewhat agreed to agreed. Similarly, the results of the One-Way ANOVA test show that the number of languages that a Brussels local speaks has a significant impact on whether they think that their multicultural city has more to offer than less diverse cities  $F(4, 34) = 3.43$ ,  $p = 019. 13$  respondents (4 to 5 language range) somewhat agreed to agreed.

The city where the participants reside and their attitude towards discouraging tourists from going to ethnic neighbourhoods were compared. On average Toronto locals ( $M = 1.45$ ,  $SD = 0.71$ ) reported more negatively than Brussels locals ( $M = 3.21$ ,  $SD = 2.05$ ). In other words, they would be less likely to discourage tourists to visiting certain ethnic parts of time. The results of an Independent Samples T-Test showed that this difference was statistically significant,  $t(67.38)=-2.19$ ,  $p<0.05$ .

The results of the Pearson Correlation Coefficient test shows there is no relationship between Brussels locals' attitudes towards discouraging tourists from going to ethnic neighbourhoods and belief that ethnic restaurants are replacing local food joints: ( $r(37)=.06$ ,  $p>0.05$ ) (table 3).

The results of the Pearson Correlation Coefficient test show there is a weak positive linear relationship between Brussels locals' attitudes towards their belief that ethnic restaurants are replacing local food joints and the notion that they would only recommend ethnic food if a tourist specifically asked for it. ( $r(37)=.37$ ,  $p<0.05$ ) (table 3).

The results of the Pearson Correlation Coefficient test show there is no relationship between Brussels locals attitudes towards the idea that becoming more politically correct is good and the belief that multiculturalism positively influences the diversity of restaurants of which to choose from ( $r(37)=0.02$ ,  $p<0.05$ ) (table 4). Therefore, it could be said that whether one tries to use more inclusive language does not predict whether they are open food from other cultures.

The results of the Pearson Correlation Coefficient test shows there is a weak positive linear relationship between Brussels locals' attitudes towards the belief that they should include the word *multicultural* when describing their city to a tourist and the idea that becoming more politically correct is good: ( $r(37)=.38$ ,  $p<0.05$ ) (table 4).

### *Open-Ended Questions*

Upon analysing the responses for the Brussels locals about Toronto, the extensive variety once again made it difficult to place the responses into separate categories. The difference was wide ranging and could be seen through answers like *Rob Ford, boat, Seastower*. Similar to the Toronto cohort, the tone of the answers remained neutral throughout. Perhaps interestingly, several answers pertained to Canada as whole. This phenomenon could be seen in words such as *Canada, bears?, Ontario, hockey, syrup* and *sorry* (a common Canadian expression). On that note, several Brussels locals commented on the manner in which Canadians speak by putting down words like *accent, aboot* and *eh*. Four respondents left this box empty and two admitted to not knowing anything about Toronto writing *jamais été* and *je ne connais pas*.

For their responses on their own city, categories were easily identifiable upon first glance. The densest category for this item was Culture with words like *international, Diverse, European* and *Muslim immigrant*. The second largest number of responses was again the Food category which included the words *bière, waffle* and *food*. The third category coincides with the categories attributed to the items mentioned above; it consists of the Negative group. Here words can be found such as *dirty, arrogant* and *soulless*. Finally, the last category consisted naturally of all the rest that was positive and miscellaneous. Words in this category were *maison, cozy, alive* and *open*.

The item which required the Brussels locals to list three activities that they would recommend to others perhaps not as indicative of how they perceive their city as the Toronto cohort. All 39 responses referred to the idea that pertained to National Culture. Overwhelmingly, the respondents suggested food related activities and some form of sightseeing. For example, *Visiting historical locations, drink beer, eat frites, Sightseeing, architecture, chocolate, beer and chocolate tours*, and *Visite de la grande place, bière, des moules chez Léon*. Indeed, most other suggestions consisted of recommending that tourists

see Grand-Place, Manneken Pis, Sainte Catherine and walk around. One respondent indicated that they had no idea *Geen idee*.

On a similar note, all but one of the Brussels participants indicated that tourists should try an assortment of Belgian food. Several simply wrote “*Belgian*” whereas others took a more in-depth approach by specifying a dish or location: *Local (Fries, Waffles, Vol-au-vent, Carbonnade) and a few pizza places, Divers établissements tout à fait différents. Mais la frite à la baraque du coin est incontournable.* A handful of respondents took a more diplomatic approach by indicating that the choice should be up to the tourist: *Ca dépend de ce qu'ils aiment :) il y en a pour tous les goûts!* or *Un peu de tout ! Il y a beaucoup de choses !*. Three responses included a mix of ethnic food as well as with Belgian food: *Middle Eastern, Belgian, Chinese and modern, French, Asian.* One respondent answered, *Italian food.*

## 5 Discussion

The results presented above do not provide enough substantial evidence that Brussels and Toronto locals consistently promote activities and cuisine that pertain solely to either national culture or multiculturality. In other words, they tend to recommend that tourists experience a mix of both types of activities.

Although the TripAdvisor scan was used mostly to aid in developing the centre piece of this study (the survey), the frequency of the topics brought up in forums did often align with what was found in the open-ended questions of the survey. When given the choice the write down three words about their own city, both Toronto and Brussels participants frequently mentioned multiculturalism and internationalism. This topic was also what was most brought up about by the locals in the forums. The fact that Brussels locals barely ever recommended ethnic food in the survey also aligned with TripAdvisor findings. This was in direct contrast to the high frequency multicultural food-talk in the Toronto forums and in the survey.

Within the survey the Toronto group held slightly more positive attitudes towards multiculturalism impacting the diversity of restaurants to choose. The Toronto locals also reported more negative attitudes towards encouraging tourists to visiting certain perhaps more ethnic neighbourhoods. The one significant difference between the two cities was that the Toronto locals perceived their city as having more to offer compared to less multicultural cities whereas the Brussels locals did not.

Upon analysing the locals' attitudes against each other, we can see that for Brussels, the belief that ethnic restaurants are replacing local food establishments correlated somewhat positively with the notion that they would only recommend ethnic food if a tourist specifically asked for it, which demonstrates a slight preference to sell national culture. Yet, the same group also responded that they would include the word "multicultural" when describing their city to a tourist and the idea that becoming more politically correct is good. When comparing the other items of the two categories against each other, no other correlation was found. For example, it was revealed that how a Brussels local feels about discouraging tourists from going to ethnic neighbourhoods cannot predict their belief that ethnic restaurants are replacing local food joints. The same can be said for the Brussels local's opinion towards the notion that becoming more politically correct is good and the belief that multiculturalism positively influences the diversity of restaurants of which to choose from. In other words, one cannot predict the other since there is no relationship between the two attitudes. Generally speaking, these findings mirror the points represented throughout Martiniello's (2013) work on Brussels embracing multiculturality. Indeed, it seems as though, locals endorsing visits to ethnic neighborhoods and embracing inclusivity talk could be considered as steps for creating a shared local identity (Martiniello, 2013).

A similar narrative can be observed with the Toronto group as there is a weak positive relationship between the notion that they tend more to promote national culture to tourists and their belief that they only recommend ethnic food if a tourist specifically asked for it, as well as with a somewhat stronger positive relationship between their attitudes on discouraging tourists from going to ethnic neighbourhoods with asking tourists what type of cultural experiences they would be interested when visiting the local's city. These are the only two comparison which indicated that there is consistency within the categories. Most of the items – within the categories – here too, also showed no correlations. For example, it can be seen that a Toronto local's notion that they would only recommend ethnic food if a tourist specifically asked for it does not predict their belief that ethnic restaurants are replacing local food joints. Neither does their idea that becoming more politically correct is good correlate with their notion that their multicultural city has more to offer compared to less diverse cities. Considering the similarity between the results of the two cities individually, there seems to be little difference in how Brussels and Toronto locals perceive and promote their respective cities. This of course is in direct contrast of what was initially predicated from the anecdotal observation.

The incongruity between the types of recommendations that the locals from both cities give, reflects the findings by Joppe, Martin and Waalen that a tourist's experience varies depending on certain factors such as country of origin (2001). In other words, if a local knows that a tourist comes from the US and not from Europe, for example, the local may adapt his recommendations accordingly.

As brought to light by some of the participants, it is plausible to assume that locals refrain from promoting elements of multiculturality over national culture in order to appeal to all crowds. This would indeed confirm the general notions found both in the Berlin and Harlem studies which stated that the increased mobility in the 21<sup>st</sup> century has made travel possible for all kinds of tourists with varying interests. A similar sentiment can be seen in Hoffman's work (2003): contemporary tourism efforts working towards drawing all people through inclusivity rather than to a niche subset. With this in mind, it makes sense as to why Toronto and Brussels resident vary the types of recommendations they provide to tourists.

One interesting but more general finding from the survey was that the more languages a Brussels local speaks at a moderate level, the more they are inclined to suggest ethnic food restaurants to a tourist. Similarly, the more languages a Brussels local speaks also has a significant impact on them thinking their multicultural city has more to offer than less diverse cities. This result makes sense in that a local who speaks several languages possibly has a sense of belonging for more than one culture. In fact, this lines up considerably well with Kramsch and Zhu's explanation for developing intercultural competence. In essence, it makes sense that the more one actively seeks to eat ethnic food, the more one would also speak multiple languages. It is possible that an individual who spoke two languages at home as a child but learning or more other languages, as well as eating different types of food, contributes to choices linked to worldly openness.

As eluded to in the results, the way in which Toronto and Brussels locals view their city based on their responses to the open ended questions proved to be so varied that it was practically impossible to interpret the results in a statistical manner other than looking at the count and percentages. It should also be noted that the percentage here is more relevant since there are an uneven number of respondents between both groups. The first glaring observation found within these eight items is that although both the Toronto and Brussels group each describe their city as being multicultural, the Brussels group would offer practically no multicultural related activity or food suggestions for tourists visiting their city. Although the Toronto group also refrained from proposing that tourists partake in multicultural activities, nearly all participants indicated they would tend to recommend ethnic

food options rather than national dishes. There are several reasons as to why this may be, such as the reality that non-indigenous population in Canada has only existed for approximately 400 years, centuries less than the variety of people who have inhabited Belgium. Another reason could be that since Toronto is bigger by land mass and population, there is simply a larger number of options from which to choose from. Finally, it is also possible that it is easier for prospective restaurant owners to obtain a permit and loan in Canada than it is in Belgium.

In addition, it is perhaps interesting to note that the Brussels locals had harsher remarks about their own city than those from Toronto. In fact, some of the responses were downright critical, whereas some of the Toronto group's positive response were so enthusiastic that they could perhaps have contained a bias throughout the entirety of the survey. This is contradicts Winter's (2007) approach to Canadian multiculturalism merely being an initiative pushed by the government. It is clear through the results that Torontonians embrace multiculturality on an individual level.

The underlying theme of the results based on the Likert Scale portion of the survey was that there were little significant relationships between the ways that the participants answered overall as well as within their group. This was foreshadowed when, upon entering all the data into SPSS, Cronbach's alpha test scores produced unacceptable results. Only when after deleting the item pertaining to discouraging visits to certain neighbourhoods could the Cronbach's alpha test be qualified as reliable, yet "poor". As mentioned earlier, the former question was perhaps too complicated since there was a sort of playful trick in the wording. In essence, the question did not explicitly state that they sometimes discourage tourists to visit ethnic neighbourhoods. Instead, the question was formulated as though they sometimes discourage tourists to visit some neighbourhoods, followed by a selection of ethnic neighbourhoods found in brackets. Therefore, it is possible that some of the respondents caught on to the play on words whereas others failed to do so.

## 6Limitations

One issue that was brought forth by survey participants was the lack of clarification pertaining to what relationship the participant has with the tourist in question. The participant rightfully mentioned that their answers would vary in nature depending on if they are friends or if it is a stranger. The commenter made the point of emphasising that the certain foods they

personally enjoy in their city would not necessarily coincide with what a tourist should objectively experience during their first experience in visiting Brussels or Toronto.

Along those same lines, a comment from a Reddit user referred to the idea that it could have been relevant to ask where the respondent came from initially. He then respondent goes on to explain that he is from New-Zealand so “real” Belgian food like good frites, stoemp, waterzooi, chocolate or beer are more of a novelty to his visitors than something like Thai or Italian.

Interestingly, a different Reddit-user, respondent who was a Brussels local, brought up the question about discouraging tourist from visiting certain neighborhoods. The user said he answered “Indifferent” to this question, however, he did want to add that tourists should exercise caution. The reason for this is, according to the Reddit-user respondent, that is that Brussels has a pickpocketing problem in certain areas which are poorer and less attractive. Regarding the low Alpha scores, one probable explanation as to why they were so low could be due to the low number of respondents. Finding at least 30 participants proved to be difficult for Brussels as the researcher knew very few people who currently live in the region. The minimum was eventually reached, which thankfully opened the door to run numerous statistical tests. However, as Dörnyei (2007) states, unacceptable Alpha scores can often be linked to small sample sizes.

## 7Concluding Remarks: Methodological Reflection; Future Research

As explained by Hoffman (2003), Kolb (2006) and Schmiz (2017) it is in the best interest for those who try to promote their cities to be inclusive when doing so, as mobility has made it possible for more people than ever before to become a tourist. The present study clearly related that locals from both Toronto and Brussels consider recommending that tourists take advantage of the multicultural side offerings of their city, as well as the food and activities that pertain more to national culture.

The somewhat significant findings consisted of the manner in which the survey could predict correlations between number of languages that Brussels locals could speak depending on their thought that multicultural city has more to offer than less diverse cities and their belief that multiculturality has bettered the options for eating out.

Then other overwhelming difference consisted of the manner in which almost all Toronto locals noted that they would recommend a tourist takes advantage of the ethnic food

options whereas the Brussels locals nearly unanimously agreed that tourists should stick to Belgian food.

Moving forward, it could be interesting for researchers to see if there is any difference between the same constructs for cities in Asia, African and/or South America. History and politics would absolutely make for tourist experiences to be considerably different in the non-western world. Additionally, and as alluded to in the previous section, clarifying if the tourist is a friend or a stranger could also be an interesting qualifier for the design of a future study. This distinction is important because it is possible that locals would cater their advice to a friend based on their shared interests rather than general highlights of their city.







Tobermory itself is a nice place to visit - this is where people board the ferry to [Manitoulin Island](#), the furthest north end of the Escarpment and the largest freshwater island in the world. Our native Indian people have a very proud heritage - along the way, numerous shops with Indian handcrafts. If you were adventurous, make it two days with an overnight stay. Georgian Bay is a rich part of our Canadian culture. Very scenic, (especially the peninsula) and within a few hours of [Toronto](#) - uniquely Canadian.

On day two, follow the shoreline of the peninsula and head over to the other side to Port Severn - the Marine Railway. This is where the railway transfers boats from the Trent Severn Waterway (connects [Lake Ontario](#) with Georgian Bay through a series of locks and canals) to the bay. The scenery is quite different on this side of the bay, as it is Cambrian shield and the iconic White Pine is everywhere.

Along the way you'll pass [Midland](#). That is the site of Fort [Sainte-Marie among the Hurons](#), one of the first settlements in [Ontario](#). The original fort was burned down, but this re-creation gives a good resemblance to what life must have been like back then.

Ok I get it now, we are not talking all of [Canada](#)... (that is HUGE... 10 Provinces - 3 Territories spread out over 8,000 Kms wide and 6 time zones)...

BUT rather we are going to focus on [Ontario](#)... so to answer your Question

ONTARIO HAS...

1- The Great Lakes. Probably the most significant thing about this part of North America... water... tons of water. The most fresh water on the entire planet. This is what makes this Province unique from every other... 4 of the 5 Great Lakes are found here. You'll definitely want to spend some time "on" or "in" the water when in Ontario.

2- [Niagara Falls](#). More water... more Great Lakes Water. The Falls actually are that the waters that are making their way downstream from Lake Erie to [Lake Ontario](#) via the [Niagara](#) River that flows between them... and it just so happens to cascade over a prehistoric glacial rock ridge (the Escarpment) and voila a Natural Wonder of the World was born... for sure you want to see Niagara Falls.

3- Natural Wilderness. This for proximity to Toronto would translate into [Algonquin](#) Park, the crown jewel of the Ontario Parks System. Aprox 3-1/2 Hours North of Toronto a park with limited road access, the size of some small countries. A prime example of our Canadian Shield Geography with rock outcrops, bogs, spring fed or snow fed lakes, and lots of forest. A good place year round... Camp, Canoe, Hike in the Summer, Leaf Peep in the Fall, and Snow Shoe in the Winter. A park filled with Canadian wildlife... Black Bears – Moose – Deer – Wolves – Coyotes – Fox – Cougars – Lynx – and Bobcat. Although count yourself lucky if you see any of them... they are fairly allusive creatures (that also have an element of danger tucked into their beauty, so they should be respected)... On the other hand the smaller more mischievous can be a real unwelcome guest in any campsite... Raccoons, Porcupines, Skunks would count in those numbers. As someone else has said if you can [rent a car](#) then that is a MUST DO... the [car](#) is king in Canada not only is it the best way to get around... offering ultimate flexibility vs an inter-city public transit system that leaves a lot to be desired – Expensive, Inconvenient – and doesn't go everywhere due to demand... (Canada's very scant population spread out over a huge land mass). But as I often say, Canada is quite different from other places... although our cities are nice... it is the bits between the cities that are truly amazing. One has to rethink things and realize that when it comes to Canada, the "destination" isn't the next city... but rather the "destination" is the journey in between them.

So in Ontario that would include...(just a few examples)

The Niagara Peninsula in Southern Ontario (between Niagara Falls and Toronto).

[Stratford](#) & St Jacobs (between Toronto & [London](#))

The [Muskoka](#) Lake District (between Toronto and [North Bay](#)).

Georgian Bay (between Toronto and [Sudbury](#))

Quinte Isle & PE County (between Toronto and [Kingston](#))

The 1000 Islands (between Kingston and [Montreal](#))

The [Rideau Canal](#) & Rideau Lakes (between Kingston and [Ottawa](#))

Anyways... I think you get the jist... ya can't see the best bits on a bus or train, or from an expressway... ya have to get off the main traffic corridors (they just use the shortest route between places... not particularly scenic, and most just cut thru farmland) instead go find the places that don't naturally have cities built around them, but rather are gems because of what they offer in the way of scenic beauty and natural charm.

LOL, but that doesn't mean our cities aren't worth a look see too !!

5- Cities. Toronto (Canada's largest) – Ottawa (the National Capital) are both MUST DOs, but you'll also find cities like [Windsor](#) – London – Niagara Falls – Kingston have much to offer as well. As does North Bay – Sudbury – [Sault Ste Marie](#) – and [Thunder Bay](#), but this latter list are all considered to be in the northern part of the Province so less likely that you'll get up that way.

So that's a summary of what makes Ontario Great !!

And because others have also added a few [Quebec](#) Destinations into the mix... I will too. Both Montreal and [Quebec City](#) are worthwhile visits. Montreal more cosmopolitan (it is Canada's 2nd largest city) while Quebec City is small and unique... nothing else like it in North America.

Quebec City is the Birthplace of North America... where the French Explorers first made their "home base" from which to launch their canoes and travel inland via the Magnificent St Lawrence River, and the Mighty Ottawa River... so as to ultimately map out all of the continent from the Atlantic thru to [Hudson](#)'s Bay in the North, and out to middle America beyond the Great Lakes, as well as South to the Gulf of Mexico. Quebec City is also considered to be the "cradle" to French Culture... for now some 400+ years later the continent looks much different than when [the French](#) arrived in the early 1500s... once the dominant group, they now are the minority (having lost the Seven Year War to the British) and have been relegated to just a small corner of North America. Where they work to preserve their language, culture and traditions. So a visit to Quebec City is something very special.... a place of living history... where one can easily stop and look out over the St Lawrence and imagine those early Voyageurs, but also see how interwoven French is into the Canadian fabric... for in some small way there is a bit of that original rugged perserverance against the odds to be found in all of us.

Count on a minimum of 2 Weeks to explore Ontario (3 would be better).

Count on a minimum of 2 Days each for Ottawa and Montreal, 3 or 4 for Quebec City... and well Toronto can easily merit a week.

Hope this is helpful in your making a decision on where to visit....

Hi,

I might be a bit late with my advice, but anyway... I stumbled accidentally upon your post searching for something else... Several posters have already given you great advices, but I'd like to add a few thoughts anyway.

[Canada](#) is a little bigger than say Belize, so different people may suggest quite different things as uniquely Canadian. First which comes to mind is probably vastness, nature and wilderness, but actually you need to be much farther west to really feel that. What is reachable in reasonable time from NY would not be much different from what you can see, for example, in the Adirondack Park in NY State (btw I don't think you can see much there anyway if you rely only on public transportation). 1000 Islands are great, but you don't have to cross the border to enjoy that – you can take a boat trip from [Alexandria Bay](#) on the US side.

If you intend to take intercity buses, then you are more or less confined to major urban areas. [Toronto](#) would not be much different than most of large North American cities, unless you like to go on really tall towers ([CN tower](#) used to be the largest man-made structure in the world; not any longer thanks to Dubai...). Toronto is probably much cleaner and safer than cities of that size south of the border though. If I wanted to see something completely different, I would choose [Quebec City](#), [Montreal](#) and [Ottawa](#) (in this order). Greyhound bus would take you to Montreal from NY City in about 7 hours (btw it is much closer than Toronto from NY). To get from there to Quebec City or Ottawa, you'll have to change to the [Quebec](#) bus company Voyager – it is in the same Terminus bus station. You will not need a [car](#) in either Quebec or Montreal, in fact it is easier to travel there without a [car](#). In [Old Quebec city](#) walking gets you anywhere you need within the fortifications. If you want to see the Montmorency Falls nearby just take a city bus (it still within the city limits). In Montreal one needs just walking plus Metro (subway, underground). Ottawa could perhaps be of less interest to you since British heritage might be somewhat similar in NZ (though I do not know myself).





Evening meal at The Guru – very acceptable Indian meal. Just caught the Fireworks over the Falls then a few beers in Rainforest Café.

Day 7 – Monday.

Packed and checked out, leaving luggage in hotel. Bought tickets for People Mover. Went to [Whirlpool Aero Car](#) – great ride, took loads of photos. Continued to [Botanical Gardens](#) and [Butterfly conservatory](#), then back to [White Water Walk](#). Lunch nearby then bus back to hotel.

“The Nightmare Begins”.

Shuttle arrived 5-00pm for transfer to Hamilton airport. Queue for 90 minutes then told [plane](#) not available due to “mechanical breakdown”. Shuttle bus to [Sheraton Hamilton hotel](#), arrive 9-00pm. Given vouchers for food – totally inadequate and only covered half of costs for a basic snack. E.g. Breakfast voucher for \$10 but a bowl of oatmeal was \$8.50 plus tax plus 15% service charge.

Bus arrived 12-30pm for new [flight](#) at 4-00pm which was then delayed to 8-00pm.

Cabin crew were Fantastic and our every need catered for, so no complaints on the eventual [flight](#).

Arrived Manchester 06-30am Wednesday, but our [flight](#) home to Spain was 3-30pm Tuesday (Oops!). with Monarch [airline](#). Re-booked a [flight](#) for 2-45pm BUT when checking in at 12-30pm was told of [flight](#) delay until 8-00pm. Tired and fed up we re-scheduled for 07-30am Thursday and booked into hotel. Finally arrived home Thursday afternoon – 2 days late.

## Summary

TORONTO – Not impressed!! Maybe the poor weather dictated poor impression, but probably not. A very boring city. Won't be returning However, Great people!! Everyone we met were very, very friendly.

- There are some [car rental companies](#) that will not permit their [cars](#) out of the province or out of the country, or charge a premium if they do. Most of the larger rental companies will allow cross border travel.

Ensure that the [car rental](#) company notes on the rental agreement that they authorize you to take the [car](#) into the US. You may be asked by Customs when entering the US, or when re-entering [Canada](#), for this documentation.

- As a citizen of the UK, upon entering the US, you will be required to obtain an I-94W visa waiver, as an addition to your passport. To obtain the waiver, you will be photographed, fingerprinted, and pay a fee of \$6 US.

The I-94W visa waiver will be attached to your passport, and must be surrendered when you leave the [United States](#).

The process of obtaining the I-94W waiver takes on average ½ an hour.

Try to define your visit as an intellectual inquiry for learning much about [Canada](#). Intellectual inquiry can be pursued in many settings like major museums and libraries. Show an interest in universities and their programs. I have spent time in bookstores with cafes for intellectual conversations. I personally stay away from so called entertainment districts. Going to Canada to drink Molson Ale is not an intellectual pursuit. Going to Canada to absorb or hear loud popular rock music is not a sufficient reason to describe your visit as intellectual. Ask telling questions about several topics central to Canada's identity. Show a curiosity. Wait for a response. Tell the people at the National Gallery - I mean employees - that visiting the gallery and attending lectures and seeing films there is more valuable than watching ice hockey games. Visit the book

or gift shop there at the gallery. So many avenues lead to intellectual experiences that can define your visit. Do not walk through art exhibits munching on two ham sandwiches and drinking a milk shake. After attending recitals for classical music do not throw away your program as you exit the recital hall. Keep it and read it. Visit the cultural institutes for many foreign countries in [Toronto](#). These have been my guidelines for many years. Hope they can inspire and guide you. Learn the rules for learning about Toronto and other large cities but do not allow those do's and don'ts to define your visit. Take the subway and climb to the top of needle tower if this is your best ambition, but so not allow these successes to justify or define your being there. This is my vantage point on travel in Canada. I avoid large crowds that congregate to see the same events.

Read about these places soon. [Antwerp](#) probably deserves more time in part because of its size and cultural content. Stay there for two days. [Ghent](#) and [Bruges](#) maybe deserve one day or less each depending on your cultural interests leading you there. Train travel in [Belgium](#) is good so do not rely on driving [rental cars](#) or private drivers masquerading as tour guides. In these places and others you can find examples of architectural design so select your destinations accordingly. Contact universities that have schools of architecture first and ask questions. If you live near large universities that have art schools with collections or training programs for architecture for European countries go there and make inquiries and ask questions. Five days will go fast so utilize your time wisely for getting something from being in [Brussels](#) and stay there for two days at the most with other destinations looming on the horizon. Art museum might attract your time in Brussels. Walking around central old part of the city will be beneficial - [Grande Place](#) especially. Certain places out of the loop for your tight timetable might interest you for information about architectural design. Memorials for WWI events are there. More time will be needed to include these places in your itinerary. [Leuven](#) is one example closer to Brussels. Short day trips do not deliver what they promise all the time so schedule departures carefully. Do not make the mistake of arriving at Bruges and Ghent late in the morning thereby wasting much of your time traveling on trains to return to and arriving from Brussels. You need to spend as much of an entire day as time will permit in both Bruges and Ghent. Veteran travelers might offer advice on which one deserves an over night stay since they are not the same size with different cultural ingredients worth seeing. One night in both might do many good things for you if your cultural interests and

vacation goals lead you in that direction for that purpose. So many of these places with connections to art history are heavy weight destinations and should not be treated lightly. Casual or brief visits can damage or handicap your vacation goals for this category of reasons for going to Belgium in the first place. No harm in spending more time at these places. Restrictions of your time table might make it difficult to do this comfortably. But devote more time for Antwerp by reducing your time for Brussels. By comparison for cultural content alone two days for Antwerp can be justified easily. Using Brussels as the place to stay while making day trips to these places might make sense especially if your departure by [plane](#) is from that city. How much do you enjoy traveling on trains for what are short distances in a small country? Getting the most from the city of Brussels comes around to benefitting from a different kettle of fish when comparisons are made with Ghent and Bruges. Establish or select a list of priorities and reasons for visiting Belgium. Size yourself up as a tourist with legitimate interests and match your vacation goals with the priorities mentioned above. Staying in Brussels the whole time might prove to be less than altogether satisfying but that depends on what knowledge about Belgium you bring with you and how you utilize it. Today Brussels occupies a place or position for world affairs for [Europe](#) with new buildings you might want to see. We would make that suggestion for embellishing your itinerary with examples of modern architectural design. You might be making a list for a second list as soon as you get to Belgium. Do not do unrealistic things. Your health and happiness are more important.

A highlight of our trip was to the European Parliament. Here is the information they emailed me:

Thank you for your message expressing interest in visiting the European Parliament. We would be delighted to welcome you to visit the "hemicycle" in the autumn.

Between September and June, visiting hours, with a multimedia guide (available in all official EU languages) are:

- \* Monday to Thursday: between 9h00 and 16h00
- \* Friday: between 9h00 and 12h00

Briefings about the work and role of the European Parliament by one of our speakers take place every Monday at 11h00 and 15h00 (in English and French).

There is no need to register. All you have to do is to come to the visitor entrance (Paul [Henri-Spaak](#) building, next to Park [Leopold](#) - see attached "Visit to the hemicycle" map) 15 minutes beforehand. A valid ID is required.

Visitors to the European Parliament in Brussels can now leave their [car](#) in the [car](#) park, by sending the booking request at least one working day in advance of a visit. <https://ec.europa.eu/>

The tour is free- you need to go thru a airport like security- and wear a sticker - there are postcards that you can fill out for free and they will mail them if you drop them in the box provided- as well as a "green screen" photo op where you can take a photo and email it to yourself for free as well. Our tour guide was from [Slovenia](#) and gave us a 1 hour 45 min tour (usually lasts 40-45 minutes) as he was kind enough to answer all of our questions. Our group was about 15 ppl. [Antwerp](#) should be on your list. If [Brussels](#) deserves four days then Antwerp deserves at least three. Do not become overly exhilarated and be-dazzled with visits lasting a half day to [Bruges](#) but it might not deserve that close attention for prolong periods of time but that depends on what looms on the horizon as places deserving a visit. Bruges does deserve a visit but do not become easily mesmerized with it. In southern [Netherlands](#) near Tilbourg and [Breda](#) you will find an unusual part of another country locked within the Netherlands in the form of the Belgian enclave called Baarle Herzog. See it for curiosity alone. [Eindhoven](#) is not that far away. Ardennes region might have priority. Many countries with connections with eighteenth military battles have memorials and places for honoring past heroics on the battle field. [Belgium](#) is no exception Oudenaarde and Ramilles are two places worth your time if your interests lead you in that direction for more than curiosity. Ramilles is near [Liege](#). Just inside the French border near Bavay is the small town of Malplaquet with noteworthy importance for eighteenth century battles. Visit it if your time table obligations do not get in the way. [Ghent](#) and Bruges and Antwerp by comparison certainly have greater importance for today's travelers, but this aspect of Belgian history should not be readily dismissed. Use Brussels as a good starting point in setting up and following a workable itinerary for exploring so much in Belgium Escapades to [Cologne](#) do make sense. [Maastricht](#) too. Read about these places soon. [Antwerp](#) probably deserves more time in part because of its size and cultural content. Stay there for two days. [Ghent](#) and [Bruges](#) maybe deserve one day or less

each depending on your cultural interests leading you there. Train travel in [Belgium](#) is good so do not rely on driving [rental cars](#) or private drivers masquerading as tour guides. In these places and others you can find examples of architectural design so select your destinations accordingly. Contact universities that have schools of architecture first and ask questions. If you live near large universities that have art schools with collections or training programs for architecture for European countries go there and make inquiries and ask questions. Five days will go fast so utilize your time wisely for getting something from being in [Brussels](#) and stay there for two days at the most with other destinations looming on the horizon. Art museum might attract your time in Brussels. Walking around central old part of the city will be beneficial - [Grande Place](#) especially. Certain places out of the loop for your tight timetable might interest you for information about architectural design. Memorials for WWI events are there. More time will be needed to include these places in your itinerary. [Leuven](#) is one example closer to Brussels. Short day trips do not deliver what they promise all the time so schedule departures carefully. Do not make the mistake of arriving at Bruges and Ghent late in the morning thereby wasting much of your time traveling on trains to return to and arriving from Brussels. You need to spend as much of an entire day as time will permit in both Bruges and Ghent. Veteran travelers might offer advice on which one deserves an over night stay since they are not the same size with different cultural ingredients worth seeing. One night in both might do many good things for you if your cultural interests and vacation goals lead you in that direction for that purpose. So many of these places with connections to art history are heavy weight destinations and should not be treated lightly. Casual or brief visits can damage or handicap your vacation goals for this category of reasons for going to Belgium in the first place. No harm in spending more time at these places. Restrictions of your time table might make it difficult to do this comfortably. But devote more time for Antwerp by reducing your time for Brussels. By comparison for cultural content alone two days for Antwerp can be justified easily. Using Brussels as the place to stay while making day trips to these places might make sense especially if your departure by [plane](#) is from that city. How much do you enjoy traveling on trains for what are short distances in a small country? Getting the most from the city of Brussels comes around to benefitting from a different kettle of fish when comparisons are made with Ghent and Bruges. Establish or select a list of priorities and reasons for visiting Belgium. Size yourself up as a tourist with legitimate interests and match your vacation goals with the priorities mentioned above. Staying in Brussels the whole time might prove to be less than altogether satisfying but that depends on what knowledge about Belgium you bring with you and how you utilize it. Today Brussels occupies a place or position for world affairs for [Europe](#) with new buildings you might want to see. We would make that suggestion for embellishing your itinerary with examples of modern architectural design. You might be making a list for a second list as soon as you get to Belgium. Do not do unrealistic things. Your health and happiness are more important.

Between September and June, visiting hours, with a multimedia guide (available in all official EU languages) are:

\* Monday to Thursday: between 9h00 and 16h00

\* Friday: between 9h00 and 12h00

Briefings about the work and role of the European Parliament by one of our speakers take place every Monday at 11h00 and 15h00 (in English and French).

There is no need to register. All you have to do is to come to the visitor entrance (Paul [Henri-Spaak](#) building, next to Park [Leopold](#) - see attached "Visit to the hemicycle" map) 15 minutes beforehand. A valid ID is required.

Visitors to the European Parliament in Brussels can now leave their [car](#) in the [car](#) park, by sending the booking request at least one working day in advance of a visit. <https://ec.europa.eu/>

The tour is free- you need to go thru a airport like security- and wear a sticker - there are postcards that you can fill out for free and they will mail them if you drop them in the box provided- as well as a "green screen" photo op where you can take a photo and email it to yourself for free as well. Our tour guide was from Slovenia and gave us a 1 hour 45 min tour (usually lasts 40-45 minutes) as he was kind enough to answer all of our questions. Our group was about 15 ppl. We don't have outdoor parties on NYE, with or without free admission, unless you count the free fireworks display which in the last few years has been done from the area around the [Atomium](#), at Heysel metro station some 20-30 mins outside the city centre on metro line 6. Plans are never announced before the end of November/ beginning of December but I would expect nothing to change this year. The redesign of Place de Brouckère was supposed to have been done partly to make this the NYE venue (before that they were set off from [Mont des Arts](#)), but for security reasons the fireworks were moved out to Heysel and I think the city prefers it out there. Of course the big difficulty is then getting back into the city centre with all the crowds, even if public transport is free after midnight (but not necessarily running all night...).

There are plenty of bars in St. Géry etc. that are open for drinks without any admission charge, as well as organised parties (especially in discos/ nightclubs), which do charge. If you want a meal, it will be necessary to book at any proper restaurant, and they will mostly be serving a special, multi-course (expensive) meal with limited choices. Nightclubs and restaurants both start to advertise their offers around the beginning of December.

If you want some sort of community activity, you'd do better to go to Brugge which has a (free) group sing-song in 't Zand square (or other large square) every NYE. Songs are mostly the year's pop hits in Dutch, French and English, and they distribute song-sheets to help with the words.

P.S. If you google YouTube New Years Eve [Brussels](#) (or Brugge) you should find plenty of videos to give you an idea what sort of things might be going on.

[Antwerp](#) should be on your list. If [Brussels](#) deserves four days then Antwerp deserves at least three. Do not become overly exhilarated and be-dazzled with visits lasting a half day to [Bruges](#) but it might not deserve that close attention for prolong periods of time but that depends on what looms on the horizon as places deserving a visit. Bruges does deserve a visit but do not become easily mesmerized with it. In southern [Netherlands](#) near Tilbourg and [Breda](#) you will find an unusual part of another country locked within the Netherlands in the form of the Belgian enclave called Baarle Herzog. See it for curiosity alone. [Eindhoven](#) is not that far away. Ardennes region might have priority. Many countries with connections with eighteenth military battles have memorials and places for honoring past heroics on the battle field. [Belgium](#) is no exception Oudenaarde and Ramilles are two places worth your time if your interests lead you in that direction for more than curiosity. Ramilles is near [Liege](#). Just inside the French border near Bavay is the small town of Malplaquet with noteworthy importance for eighteenth century battles. Visit it if your time table obligations do not get in the way. [Ghent](#) and Bruges and Antwerp by comparison certainly have greater importance for today's travelers, but this aspect of Belgian history should not be readily dismissed. Use Brussels as a good starting point in setting up and following a workable itinerary for exploring so much in Belgium Escapades to [Cologne](#) do make sense. [Maastricht](#) too.
